

Great Awakening Main Points

- It was a religious revival in the 1730's & 1740's that swept through the colonies.
- In New England and Middle Colonies ministers called for a "rebirth" or a return to the strong faith of earlier days.
- It created a greater religious and political freedom in the colonies.
- Church went from boring to interesting.
- The belief that all people are equal grew.

Great Awakening Main Points

- Colonists started challenging authority and speaking their minds.
- Education became more important
- For the first time all the colonies, North to South, were united in a common cause.
- Made way for the rapid spread of political ideas and revolutionary fervor during the struggle for independence.


